Quality Service Opportunities

- **First Platoon**
 - On April 8, the Canine Unit performed two canine presentations for children at the State Street Academy per their request.
 - On April 20, an officer paid for the lunch of the person in line behind him at a drive through restaurant.

- **Second Platoon**
 - On April 14, two officers assisted a stranded motorist at the LEC. The motorist was traveling to Gladwin and did not have enough gas to make the trip. Officers followed the motorist to the gas station and put \$15.00 worth of gas in her vehicle.

Other Agency Assist

- **First Platoon**
 - On April 24, officers were requested to check for a runaway at the rescue mission. The juvenile was located and turned over to Richfield Township Police Department.

- **Second Platoon**
 - On April 14, an officer conducted follow-up for a detective from the Springdale, Arkansas Police Department concerning a fraud complaint.

Enforcement Efforts

- **First Platoon**

- On April 5, an officer was working traffic enforcement when they observed a vehicle traveling with several equipment violations. A traffic stop was conducted and a large quantity of suspected methamphetamine was eventually located. Additional evidence of possession with intent to deliver was also located. The subject was also wanted by VIPER for previous controlled buys.
- On April 10, an officer initiated a traffic stop for illegal window tint. The driver was subsequently arrested for having a concealed handgun in the vehicle. Along with the handgun, a large quantity of cash and marijuana was also seized.
- On April 23, an officer observed a vehicle with an expired registration. A traffic stop was conducted and the driver was found to have a suspended driver's license.
- On April 24, an officer located a suspect vehicle from an assault and hit and run incident. The officer initiated a traffic stop and later arrested the suspect for several charges including Operating While Intoxicated.
- On April 29, officers conducted a warrant attempt on a subject with a felony arrest warrant for VCSA. The subject was also the source of several service calls. The subject was located, arrested, and lodged at the jail.
- Officers and a Detective were conducting follow up in reference to a series of stolen mopeds in the area. The suspect was located in the driveway engaged in suspected drug deal. The suspect was arrested for a probation detained and a quantity of methamphetamine located on his person. Two of the stolen mopeds were previously recovered by officers.

- **Second Platoon**

- On April 6, an officer observed a vehicle traveling without a registration plate and initiated a traffic stop. The driver was found to have a suspended license and the vehicle was not registered or insured. The driver was cited for all offenses and arrested for an outstanding warrant out of our department.
- On April 13, an officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for littering. The officer contacted the driver and initiated an OWI investigation. The driver was found to have a Blood Alcohol Level of .30. The driver was arrested for OWI 6th offense.
- On April 15, an officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle traveling in the opposing lane of traffic. The driver was found to have no license and cited for that and careless driving.
- On April 15, an officer observed a vehicle traveling without a license plate and conducted a traffic stop. The driver admitted to knowing it didn't have registration or insurance on it. The driver was cited for both offenses.
- On April 16, an officer stopped a vehicle for a minor equipment violation. During the stop, it was discovered that the driver had two outstanding warrants for their arrest, and a digital scale in their possession. The suspect was lodged and the scale was sent to the lab for testing on the visible residue on the scale.
- On April 17, an officer made a traffic stop for an improper turn. The driver did not have current registration or a valid driver's license. The driver was cited for both offenses as well as a defective equipment violation.
- On April 19, an officer stopped a vehicle without a registration plate. The vehicle was found to be unregistered and uninsured. The driver was cited for both offenses.
- On April 26, an officer conducted a traffic stop at Washington Ave and Seventh Street and found the driver to have a restricted license. The subject was cited and released.

Traffic Enforcement Details

- **First Platoon**

- Green Platoon officers worked traffic enforcement while on patrol for a total of 91 hours and 32 minutes working the following areas: Independence Bridge, Marquette Avenue, Henry Street, Midland Street, Salzburg Avenue, Jenny Street, Wenona Street, Washington Avenue, Trumbull Avenue, Center Avenue, Lincoln Street, Johnson Street, Madison Avenue, Woodside Avenue, Columbus Avenue, Garfield Avenue, Twenty-Sixth Street, and Michigan Avenue.
- Green Platoon officers performed directed traffic enforcement along Center Avenue for April 9th, 10th, and 11th. During the traffic detail 10 citations were issued for various violations. A driver was also arrested for CCW when a handgun was discovered in his vehicle.
- Blue Platoon officers worked traffic enforcement while on patrol for a total 77 hours and 8 minutes in the following areas: Adams Street, Broadway Avenue, Center Avenue, Columbus Avenue, Euclid Avenue, Farragut Street, Garfield Avenue, Hart Street, Henry Street, Independence Bridge, Jackson Street, Jenny Street, Lafayette Avenue, Lincoln Avenue, Madison Avenue, Marquette Avenue, Michigan Avenue, Midland Street, East North Union Street, Raymond Street, State Street, Thomas Street, Transit Street, Truman Parkway, Water Street, Wenona Avenue, and Wilder Road.
- Blue Platoon officers performed a traffic detail on April 13 in the area of Center Avenue and Lincoln Street. The detail yielded seven total stops for Speeding with a total of three citations and four verbal warnings being issued. A citation for no insurance was also issued.
- Blue Platoon officers performed a speeding and quality of life related traffic detail in the area of Garfield Avenue and Fifteenth Street on April 18. The detail yielded a total of seven stops for Speed and Registration Violations. During the detail four total citations were issued and five verbal warnings issued as well.

- **Second Platoon**

- Blue Platoon officers worked traffic enforcement while on patrol for a total of 110 hours and 55 minutes working the following areas: North Water Street, Madison Avenue, Michigan Avenue, Cass Avenue, Farragut Street, Kosciuszko Avenue, Broadway Avenue, McGraw Street, Stanton Street, Marsac Street, Columbus Avenue, Center Avenue, Marquette Avenue, Henry Street, State Street, Walnut Street, Salzburg Avenue, Wenona Avenue, North Union Street, Third Street, Fourth Street, and Eleventh Street.
- Green Platoon officers worked traffic enforcement while on patrol for a total of 107 hours and 7 minutes working the following areas: First Street, Sixth Street, Seventh Street, Adams Street, Broadway Avenue, Cass Avenue, North Catherine Street, Center Avenue, Columbus Avenue, Garfield Avenue, Jane Street, West Jenny Street, Lafayette Avenue, South Lincoln Avenue, North Lincoln Avenue, Kosciuszko Avenue, West Hart Street, North Henry Street, South Henry Street, Marquette Avenue, McKinley Avenue, North Farragut Street, Park Avenue, Saginaw Street, Salzburg Avenue, East Smith Street, State Street, North Trumbull Street, East Vermont Street, South Water Street, North Walnut Street, Washington Avenue, North Wenona Avenue, and Woodside Avenue.
- Blue Platoon officers performed a traffic detail in the area of Water Street and Fourth Street on April 17. The detail yielded two stops for Squealing Tires and Loud Exhaust. During the detail two citations were issued.

Crime Suppression Efforts (Officer Self-Initiated Non-Enforcement Activity to Reduce Crime)

- **First Platoon**
 - Officers completed 136 Park checks totaling approximately 15 hours and 26 minutes.
 - Officers completed 151 actions of “Appeared Secure” for building checks.
 - Officers left door hangers at a total of 45 businesses.
 - Officers recorded business checks totaling approximately 9 hours and 16 minutes.
 - Officers continue to complete C.O.P. stops daily during their shift totaling 128 for the month.

- **Second Platoon**
 - Officers completed 201 Park checks totaling approximately 26 hours and 47 minutes.
 - Officers completed 369 actions of “Appeared Secure” for building checks.
 - Officers left door hangers at a total of 182 businesses.
 - Officers recorded business checks totaling approximately 24 hours and 14 minutes.
 - Officers continue to complete C.O.P. stops nightly during their shift totaling 159 for the month.

Detective Bureau Recap

- A detective was assigned a CSC case that originated in Richfield Township and was later found to have occurred in Bay City. The detective took over the investigation and set up a CAC interview with the victim. Richfield Township Public Safety had already obtained a confession from the suspect. This investigation has been sent to the Prosecutor’s Office with a warrant request
- Detectives responded with Patrol Operations to the report of shots fired at Florence Street and North Erie Street. Shell casings were located in the intersection. No bullet impacts were located and no injuries were reported. This investigation has no leads at this time and is inactive.
- A detective was assigned follow up on a CSC case. The detective conducted interviews with the victim and witness. This investigation has been sent to the Prosecutor’s Office for review of charges.

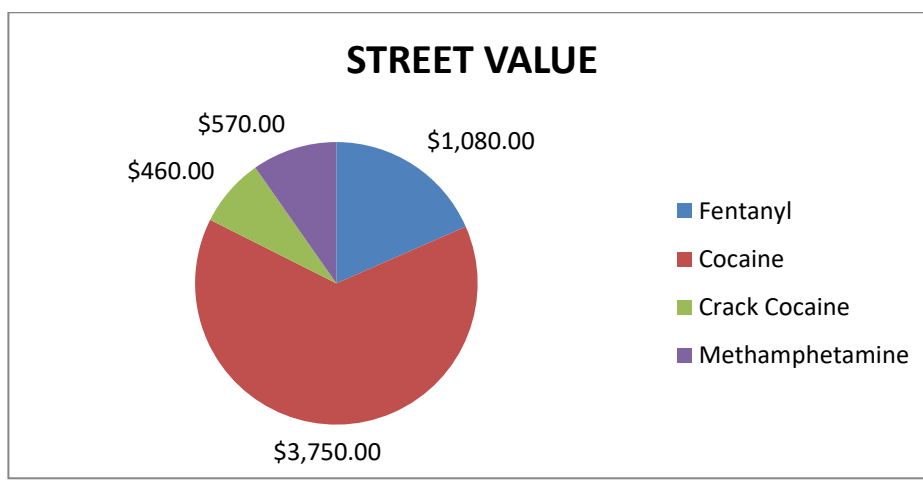

Operational Assignments

- Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) – Annual SCBA flow testing began for all department members.
- Radios – No new information to report.
- Hose – Hose testing will begin May 1, 2021. The recordkeeping document on public drive has been updated with NFPA 1962 guidelines on hose testing pressures and times.
- Gas Meters – No new information to report.
- Vehicle Maintenance – Engine 1 had the EMS cabinet doors repaired. Engine 2 had the radiator repaired, as well as cab mounts and bearings replaced. 1 Aerial had preventative maintenance completed. Work commenced for Marine 1.
- Water/Ice Rescue – Weekly and monthly testing of Boat 1 and equipment completed and in ready condition. Work continues to be done on the new rescue boat for it to be placed into service.
- Station Equipment Checklist – Updated and completed for April.
- Small Tools/Equipment Maintenance – All yard and lawn equipment has been checked and prepared for summer use. Some broken axe handles were replaced. Six chain saw chains were repaired and sharpened.
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS) – PPE stock is in good standing for all items required for safe interactions with the community.
- Michigan EMS Information System (MI-EMSIS) – April reports were imported to the State properly and we are up-to-date and in compliance.
- Continuing Education Units (CEUs) – Mayday CEUs were completed in April.

- Central Dispatch/911 Liaison – All units are responding under a revised dispatch protocol eliminating the COVID screening. Our internal response directives are still in effect to limit exposure and conserve PPE. These response directives are in accordance with the state protocol. We are currently working with 911 dispatch on a couple of dispatch performance issues.
- Quality Assurance – NFIRS reports for the month of April were completed; achieved an average of 97% over the 11 categories that are reviewed. Average response time for the month of fire related calls is 4:05.
- SDS Sheets – Books at all stations are current with no updates needed.
- Building Maintenance – The Chimney Doctor will clean the chimney at Station 1 in May. A bad valve was replaced on the boiler system at Station 5. Debris catch pans are being fabricated for the floor drains in the apparatus bays at each station; the pans will eliminate the need to have the floor drains cleaned each year thus saving money. The new gear extractors were installed at Stations 1 and 4; all turnout gear can be cleaned in-house now. All stations performed spring cleaning.
- Uniforms – Waiting for delivery on a few job shirts that were ordered.
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) – Updated gear inventory in computer database and prepared new round of gear to send out for advanced inspection. Prepared and submitted an updated list of inventory to the Fire Chief. Contacted vendor for updated price list.
- City-Owned Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) – All city owned AED's are accounted for and in good working order.
- Hazardous Materials /Tier II – No new information to report.
- Supplies – An inventory was conducted, and minimal supplies were ordered for April.
- Pre-surveys – No new information to report.

Mutual Aid

- The Fire Division provided mutual aid on two incidents in April.
- The Fire Division did not receive mutual aid in April.

Quality Service Opportunities

- On April 15, crews on the A-Shift used One Aerial to hang a new American flag for the Bradley House located in the 100 block of Fifteenth Street.

Regional Response Team 31/Technical Rescue Team (RRT)

- A Battalion Chief and two Lieutenants attended a four-day structural collapse class in Saginaw, March 16-19, 2021.
